IDK Um(Welt)Denken Colloquium

University of Augsburg, Ludwig-Maximilians University Munich 15-17 February, 2023

Description: The IDK Colloquium offers a genuine opportunity to present and discuss each individual project with a large and interdisciplinary audience of like-minded scholars. The supervisors are also on-site to support and inspire the Ph.D. students with their questions, ideas, and suggestions.

The aim of the IDK Colloquium is to discuss one's thoughts and ideas in an academic environment and practice scholarly conversations across disciplines. It is an ideal training ground for practicing how to talk about one's topic in a way that is short and concise but also for learning how to make one's topic accessible and comprehensible for a multidisciplinary audience.

Format: In preparation for the IDK Colloquium, Ph.D. students hand in a short paragraph about their project to allow all others to come prepared with meaningful questions. During the colloquium, each Ph.D. student has 10 minutes to present their project, along with questions they would like to discuss. The discussion then lasts for 30 minutes. The moderators who guide discussants through the IDK colloquium follow a particular set of guidelines that all participants have agreed upon.

Expectations: Participation in the IDK colloquium is mandatory for all Ph.D. students. It is a 2-3-day event. All participants are expected to come prepared and contribute to creating an academically fruitful atmosphere.
